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ESSENTIAL PARTNERS HOSTS INAUGURAL BIPOC COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE GATHERING

On December 18th, Essential Partners convened its inaugural Community of Practice BIPOC Gathering, a 90-minute webinar designed to engage and connect with BIPOC community members.

This initiative was spearheaded by EP's Community of Practice liaison, Winnie Rugamba, who sought to understand how diverse communities interact with EP's approach. In recent years, EP has strategically expanded its reach to diverse populations, focusing on ensuring its work is culturally relevant and accessible across various norms and languages. This includes adapting the language and application of EP's methods to resonate within specific community contexts.

EP has made significant investments in supporting its Community of Practice through expanded resources, such as free consultations, peer learning webinars, and office hours. To foster deeper engagement with BIPOC communities and organizations, EP explored strategies to build more meaningful relationships. The concept of consistent one-on-one coaching emerged as a potential avenue to better understand how BIPOC individuals utilize EP's approach and identify areas for tailored support.

The inaugural BIPOC webinar was launched as part of the peer learning series and aligned with EP's strategic goal of initiating one-on-one coaching with 6-8 BIPOC community members. The event garnered significant interest, with 20 attendees, including current and former associates, new clients, Open Enrollment Workshop participants, and those involved in past micro-trainings. This demonstrated a clear need for dedicated spaces and community for BIPOC practitioners.

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The webinar's primary objectives were to facilitate connection, introduce EP's associates of color, and explore participants' experiences with EP's approach. Discussions centered on how attendees connected with EP, their positive experiences, and the challenges they faced in implementing the approach within their specific contexts. The event successfully created a safe space for participants to raise questions, share experiences, and celebrate the impact of EP's work within their communities. Attendees appreciated the focus on the intersectionality of identities and the recognition of multiple identities within BIPOC communities.

This webinar served as a crucial step towards initiating the one-on-one coaching series, with three participants already signed up. EP plans to continue this initiative, hosting quarterly gatherings to further explore the questions and themes raised during the inaugural event.

OPEN ENROLLMENT WORKSHOP HIGHLIGHT: BUILDING RELATIONSHIP WITH A LOCAL LEADER

Essential Partners believes dialogue should be accessible to everyone. Through donor-funded Open Enrollment Workshops, we share our dialogic approaches globally, empowering communities to build stronger social fabrics. We offer scholarships to under-resourced communities, equipping them with the tools to facilitate vital conversations. Our alumni join a global Community of Practice, receiving ongoing support and learning opportunities.

These workshops connect us with inspiring individuals like Wendy Tuck, a Parkersburg, West Virginia councilperson. Parkersburg, grappling with industrial decline and environmental concerns, faces deep community divisions. Three years ago, Wendy used EP-designed conversation starters in Cortico and Deloittefunded listening sessions on energy transitions in Appalachia. In St. Mary's, WV, residents with opposing views on a coal power plant engaged in their first meaningful dialogue.

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I noticed right away that using dialog as an entry into group discussions set a qualitatively different tone that carried through the whole evening. Using the stories and conversation starters provided by Essential Partners built relationships, created awe and wonder, and awakened empathy and interest. We also found many many more ideas, values, and experiences in common. A simple query about sharing a time you felt Parkersburg was a vital and liveable city brought both the nostalgia of shopping with grandparents, but also an awareness of sharp racial fears that existed and still exist in the community.

Essential Partners is proud to be a catalyst for positive change in Parkersburg, demonstrating how our open source opportunities can seed growth and build movements.

SHENANDOAH UNIVERSITY TRANSFORMS CAMPUS CULTURE WITH REFLECTIVE STRUCTURED DIALOGUE

Since 2017, Shenandoah University has embedded Reflective Structured Dialogue into its curriculum and campus life, spurred by a need to address divisive issues following the Charlottesville "Unite the Right" rally. A group of faculty members attended one of EP's Open Enrollment Workshops, and as a result launched Shenandoah Conversations, integrating RSD into undergraduate education and extracurricular activities.


The program's impact is significant: over 150 faculty members are trained in RSD, 3,400+ students have participated, and 275+ students are trained as dialogue facilitators. RSD has become integral to SU's culture, enabling constructive conversations on sensitive topics. Faculty like Jonathan Noyalas use RSD to navigate controversial historical issues, fostering a safe environment for students to explore complex perspectives. "RSD has been the most transformative thing in my 21 years of teaching," Noyalas states. Other departments, from chemistry to music therapy, utilize RSD to enhance collaboration and create inclusive learning spaces.

Shenandoah Conversation's motto, "Be understood. Be understanding," reflects the program's success. An October 2023 dialogue focused on the conflict in Israel-Gaza highlighted the program's ability to foster connection amidst conflict. "The cultural shift spurred by the university's commitment to RSD was the only reason that I had the faith to hold such an event at Shenandoah at that time," Minister reflects. Shenandoah University's partnership with Essential Partners has fundamentally transformed its campus, creating a culture of respectful dialogue and understanding.
